Emergency Nurse practitioners (ENPs) are an essential component of the emergency care workforce. They provide emergency care to patients presenting with diverse and undifferentiated presentations. In the U.S., almost 80% of EDs utilize NPs and physician assistants to provide care.



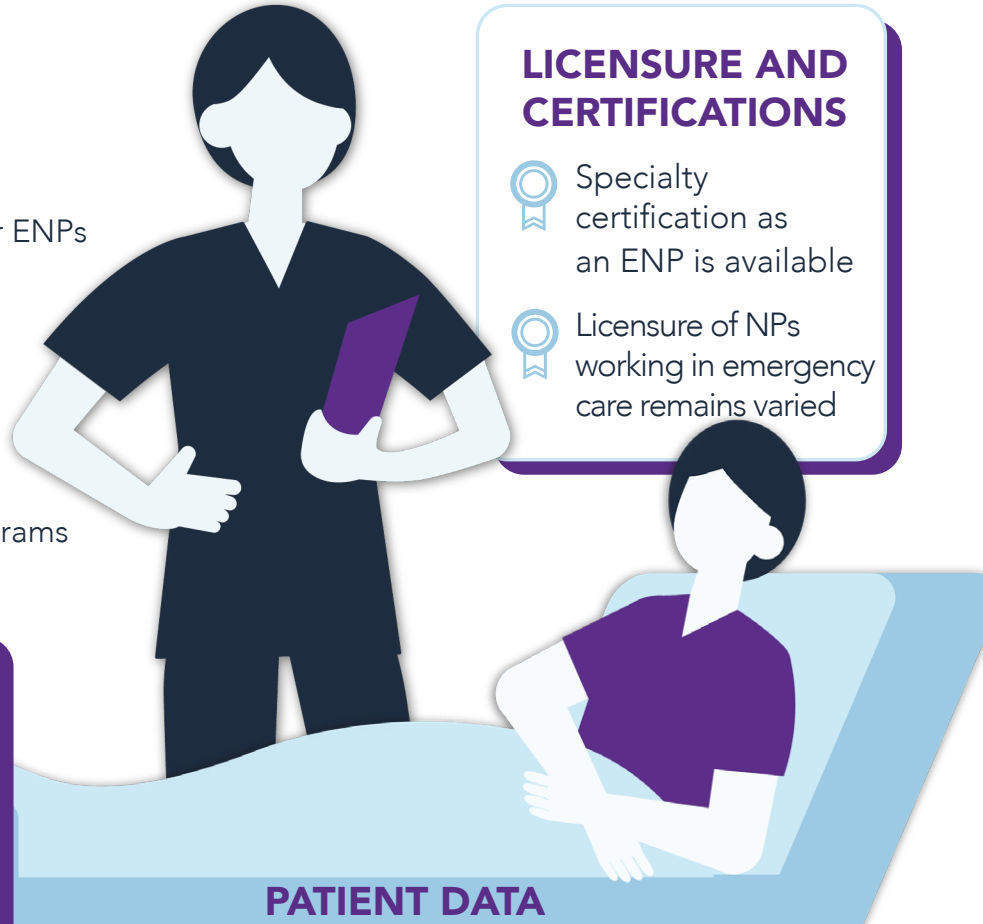
EDUCATIONAL PREPARATION

OUTCOMES OF CARE

Roughly 25,000 ENPs provide safe, efficient, and patient-centered emergency care in the US, including:

- More efficient & timely care
- Appropriate testing and treatment use
- High level of patient satisfaction



LICENSURE AND CERTIFICATIONS

- Specialty certification as an ENP is available
- Licensure of NPs working in emergency care remains varied

- Nearly 90% of ENPs care for both adult and pediatric patients
- 7% of ENPs work in adult-only ERs & 2.7% of ENPs work in pediatric-only ERs
